

PubMed Light

This cheat sheet is designed to help those individuals attempting to complete NIH Access Policy requirements and determine free full text, PMCID's, NIHMSID's and those other multiple authors you missed.

PubMed, itself part of NIH, is your friend. But you should really search it directly and not make a bibliographic manager, e.g., EndNote® search it for you. You really miss a lot of information that can help you. Now, I know that many of you already have lots of citations in your bib managers - EndNote®, Reference Manager®, etc. , and are reluctant to re-do searches.

With just a little bit of information from the citations in your bibliography, you can determine what you are missing in PubMed.

The click to PubMed from the library pages provides links to CWRU Full Text journals, CWRU Print journals, OhioLINK Electronic Journal Center (EJC), FindIT for OhioLINK holdings, format options, DOI, etc.

From the PubMed site, choose SINGLE CITATION MATCHER from the left side bar.



PubMed Single Citation Matcher

Search:

Date: (month/year) (month and day are optional)

Volume: Issue: First page:

Author name (see help): (Only as first author) (Only as last author)


Title words:

I usually just supply DATE, VOLUME, FIRST PAGE and click on GO!

If there is more than one article meeting the criteria, the display defaults to SUMMARY. There are some notations in green:

Free article in PMC
Free article at journal site
Free article in PMC | at journal site

Citations marked FREE ARTICLE AT JOURNAL SITE, must have the URL included in the bibliography and citations marked FREE ARTICLE IN PMC, or FREE ARTICLE IN PMC | AT JOURNAL SITE must have the PMCID included.

When you click on the title, the ABSTRACT DISPLAY will appear. Click on the button which says CWRU FULL TEXT  - provided you are connected properly to the CWRU network, you should be able to open the full text file. Copy the URL from the address box of your browser and paste it into the appropriate field of your bib. manager software and be sure the entry is marked ELECTRONIC, or put it directly into the bibliography in the word processor including AVAILABLE FROM....

Citations marked FREE ARTICLE IN PMC have the PMCID at the end of the abstract on the ABSTRACT DISPLAY screen.

FACTORS. CONCLUSION: PAF1 is associated significantly with most of the variables related to obesity and lipids, and demonstrates a strong association with respect to the MetS. PAF1 also associate also importantly with the variables in the MetS risk assessment.

You can copy and paste this directly into your bibliography.

The other important factor is to remember to include ALL authors – no matter how many.
