A ROSE BY ANY OTHER NAME

With many major milestones met, the Alumni Task Force has cleared one of the largest hurdles to creating Case Western Reserve University's unified alumni association—choosing a name. Now known as the Alumni Association of Case Western Reserve University, the organization is on track to its launch in October 2005.

Since its start in the fall of 2003, the Alumni Task Force has worked to combine the interests and priorities of more than twenty-five university-based alumni associations and affinity groups into one alumni association representing the entire university. The official work began last summer. Since that time, the Alumni Task Force has facilitated numerous working groups, phone conferences, forums, and surveys to solicit the views of alumni, students, university administration, and staff. The group has used information harvested from these discussions to drive the decisions regarding all facets of the new alumni organization.

The name choice reflects several key considerations, including the need to have a name that embraces all of the past, present, and future alumni. The shortened form of the association name is the Alumni Association, which the group will use in all official communications.

Additionally, the Alumni Task Force has moved forward in creating a draft version of the Alumni Association's vision and governance structure, which Harold McRae (ADL '65), university trustee and task force coordinator, presented to the Board of Trustees in February. Mr. McRae will present the final draft to President Edward M. Hundert and the board in June.

MOVED TO ACT

The tearful faces of orphaned children are driving Milan Dayalal to tap into every bit of knowledge he gained during his executive M.B.A. program at the Weatherhead School of Management.

When the most powerful earthquake in forty years erupted under the Indian Ocean near Sumatra on December 26, 2004, it caused massive, deadly waves to crash ashore in nearly a dozen countries, killing tens of thousands living in India, Indonesia, Thailand, Malaysia, and Sri Lanka.

For Mr. Dayalal (MGT '03), a sales manager for ComDoc, Inc. in Cleveland, the tsunami literally hit home. Born in Colombo, Sri Lanka, Mr. Dayalal came to the United States at age 18.

When he saw the horrific pictures of the tsunami and its aftermath, he knew he wanted to help the estimated 5,000 to 6,000 children orphaned by the disaster.

"A Third World country like Sri Lanka is not equipped to deal with a catastrophe of this magnitude, and those most affected are its children," says Mr. Dayalal. "Sri Lanka already had a problem with orphaned children, and the tsunami has multiplied that problem."

As a teen, he had volunteered for Sarvodaya, Sri Lanka's largest organization caring for the country's orphaned and destitute children, underage mothers, and elderly citizens. He returned to Sri Lanka in 1993 to work for a German company and reconnected with Sarvodaya and his volunteer work there. He remained through 1995.

To do his part to address the current problem, he has connected again with Sarvodaya, this time through the creation of his own nonprofit organization, Sri Lanka Tsunami Victim's Relief Fund. It will collaborate with Sardovaya to provide housing, food, clothing,

and medical attention to the orphans of the tsunami. He has guaranteed that 100 percent of the funds his organization raises will go toward helping the children of Sri Lanka.

In early March, Mr. Dayalal escorted the first group of physicians—Sonali Lakhani, an internist, and Lushantha Gunasekara, a plastic surgeon, of Orlando, Florida—to Sri Lanka. For three weeks, he gathered data and statistics on the number of children available for adoption. Since his return to the United States, Mr. Dayalal says he wants to coordinate his nonprofit group with international adoption agencies here to help streamline the process of getting orphans into adoptive homes. Ultimately, he hopes to build an orphanage in Sri Lanka for these children.

Mr. Dayalal credits the training he received in his E.M.B.A. program at Weatherhead with helping him to create his new nonprofit organization.

"Because of my E.M.B.A., I knew where to go and the resources to tap into to create a 501(c)(3) nonprofit," he explains. "My education in operational skills has helped me to set up systems to coordinate airline tickets, supplies, and tents. The knowledge I obtained in human behavior has helped me to communicate better with the people who want to volunteer or make donations."

Mr. Dayalal hopes people will reach out to these children. He believes children are the future, not only of Sri Lanka, but also of the world. ☐

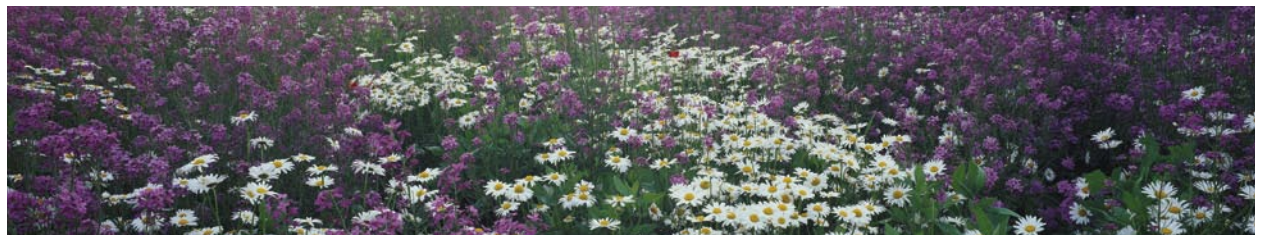

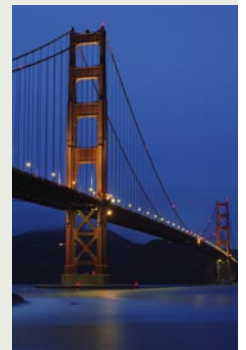
